# **People**


- Q: Who are the ministers of the Church?
- A: The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons.
- Q: What is the ministry of the laity?
- A: The ministry of lay persons is to represent Christ and his Church; to bear witness to him wherever they may be; and, according to the gifts given them, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world; and to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church.
- Q: What is the ministry of a deacon?
- A: The ministry of a deacon is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as a servant of those in need; and to assist bishops and priests in the proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments.

- Q: What is the ministry of a priest or presbyter?
- A: The ministry of a priest is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as pastor to the people; to share with the bishop in the overseeing of the Church; to proclaim the Gospel; to administer the sacraments; and to bless and declare pardon in the name of God.
- Q: What is the ministry of a bishop?
- A: The ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ's name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church; and to ordain others to continue Christ's ministry.

#### Congregation (Church of the Savior)

- Rector
  - Oversees running the church by coordinating the clergy, staff, and vestry
  - Oversees church discipline
- Clergy
  - Makes decisions about the liturgy
  - Coordinates pastoral care
- Staff
  - Daily administration and running of the church ministries
- Vestry
  - Creates the budget and proposes bylaw changes
  - Gives council to the Rector
- Members
  - Elects vestry members
  - Approves budget and amendments to bylaws

## Diocese (C4SO)

- Bishop
  - Todd Hunter
  - The ecclesiastical authority
- Executive Leadership Team
  - 10 people (half clergy, half laity)
  - Council to advise the bishop
  - Creates the budget and other administration
- Diocesan Convention
  - All Clergy & 2-6 Lay Delegates / congregation.
  - Approves budget, new Cannons, and receiving congregations to be part of C4SO

#### Province (ACNA)

- Archbishop
  - Foley Beach Bishop of the Diocese of the South
  - Presides over running the Province
- Provincial Tribunal
  - Ecclesiastical court rules on cannon law
- Executive Committee
  - 12 people (half clergy and half laity)
  - Creates the budget and oversees administration
- College of Bishops
  - ≈ 50 members (All bishops in the province)
  - Oversees doctrine and worship
- Provincial Council
  - ≈ 120-140 people (2 clergy & 2 laity / diocese)
  - Approve budget
  - Elects members to Executive Committee
  - Recommends changes to the Canons
- Assembly
  - ≈ 250-300 people (laity, clergy, and youth)
  - Ratifies changes to the Canons

## **Anglican Communion**

Independent churches (42 provinces) that have a common heritage in the Church of England Instruments of Unity / Instruments of Communion

- The Archbishop of Canterbury
  - The Primate of the Church of England
  - Being in relationship with Canterbury is part of being an official Province
- Lambeth Conference
  - Meets every 10 years or so
  - Invitation is to most of the bishops in the communion.
- Primates' Meeting
  - Meets at varying intervals
  - Consists of all the Primates (Archbishops / Presiding bishops) of the various provinces
- Anglican Consultative Council
  - Meets about every 3 years
  - Consists of clergy and laity
